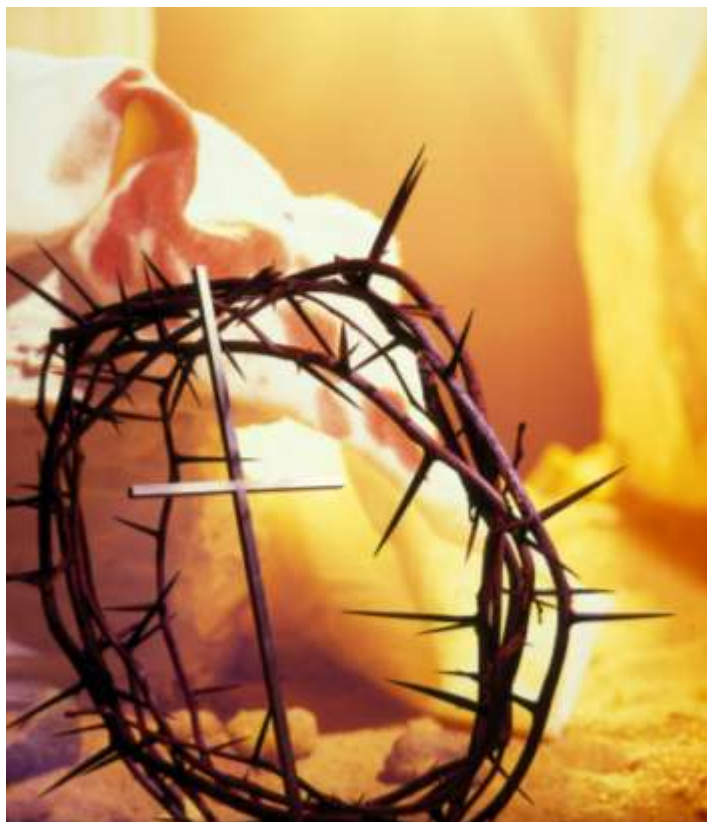

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From The Desk of The Dean



One recent weekday morning I came to St. Paul's to officiate at the 7:00 AM Morning Prayer. Shortly after I began a gentleman came in and joined me in prayer, and he also spoke with me about what brought him to join me that day. He told me of a life with addiction and recovery, of broken relationships and the promise of an upcoming marriage.

And he told me that he has finally realized his dependence on God.

When I came out of the Chapel a gathering of about thirty people were attending a Narcotics Anonymous meeting in the Dining Room. Here again, people believe that their recovery from addiction relies on their dependence on a higher power.

Then I went downstairs to the Samaritan Center to see the dozens of guests and volunteers who were there for breakfast. I also ran into John Pizzi and Jim Potts and we discussed a few items of church business.

As I walked to my car to go home to have breakfast with Jane and Serenity, and to take Serenity to school, I looked at my watch and realized it wasn't yet 8:00 AM. Except for the early morning conversations with John and Jim, all of these things happen on a regular basis early on weekday mornings. "What amazing things happen at St. Paul's Cathedral every morning", I thought to myself. Peoples' lives are transformed by their bodies and souls and minds being filled with God's love at St. Paul's. Weekday after weekday people get new life at St. Paul's.



As my thoughts turned to Easter, I began thinking about the tomb of Jesus' burial. None of us will ever know exactly how Jesus was resurrected in that tomb. Most of us do not look at a tomb and think about new life happening there; generally we do not see life when we look at a grave. I suspect that when people see the exterior of St. Paul's many do not see the new life that happens here.

But new life, new life of health and wholeness is overflowing at St. Paul's. As with the empty tomb, most people don't see the resurrections happen, they just see resurrected people.

But early mornings are great times for resurrection, whether on a Tuesday morning in Syracuse, or an early morning in Jerusalem 2,000 years ago.

Alleluia, Christ is risen. The Lord is risen indeed, Alleluia.

A few weeks ago, on a Saturday I was in the cathedral preparing for a special service that was to happen that day. The Cathedral was empty at that moment, save for Jim Potts who was playing my favorite hymn on the organ, “I want to walk as a child of the light.” Nancy Lambright was back and forth between the sacristy and altar lovingly preparing for the service as well as the Sunday morning services. I placed something on the lectern and walked down the steps to walk through the Cathedral. I paused as I came down, aware of a warmth that enveloped me as I stood there. It wasn’t the sun, but just a sense of presence; I knew I wasn’t alone as I walked down the main aisle.

The next morning in the Cathedral during the service, I was aware of the same warmth, but now the Cathedral held other people as well. New faces, visitors, as well as dear friends in Christ all ready known to me. As I read the prayers of the people- I paused for Canon Jane to offer the prayers for the ill and the departed. A gentleman came up behind me and whispered to me asking if it was an open mike, that the Dean had said he could speak.



A little startled and confused, I looked at him and although I did not know him, I stepped away to let him speak. The man was Jerome Witkin, a professor at Syracuse University, as the Dean explained to us later during announcements. Jerome spoke eloquently and passionately about his young son, Adam Pilgrim Witkin . Andrew is very ill with a rare blood disorder awaiting a bone marrow transplant at the Cleveland Clinic in Ohio. Jerome asked us to pray for Adam and indeed we did and continue to.

The prayer shawl ministry continues to thrive and Canon Jane decided that we should bless the shawls as they come in. So the prayer shawls will not only hold the prayers of the one who created them but be a blessing at our Sunday services. So a



lovely pile of soft, warm shawls were brought forward at the offering and were blessed by the Dean. After the Eucharist as the choir, clergy, and altar servers began to process out, Jane reached down and picked up a lovely blue shawl and then placed it in Mr. Witkin’s arms as she passed him. He received it gratefully and held it as he prayed.

It was during the coffee hour that I first heard, ” Wasn’t there something special about today’s service. Could you feel the spirit?” At least twice more during the week, I heard the same questions from others!

Friends, were not our hearts burning within us? Jesus is present to us and within us as we continue to heal and move forward as we embrace our future. I invite you all to pause and feel the spirit and allow it to transform you as we move into the Easter season. The Peace of Christ Be With You All!

Priorities and Playing to Your Strengths

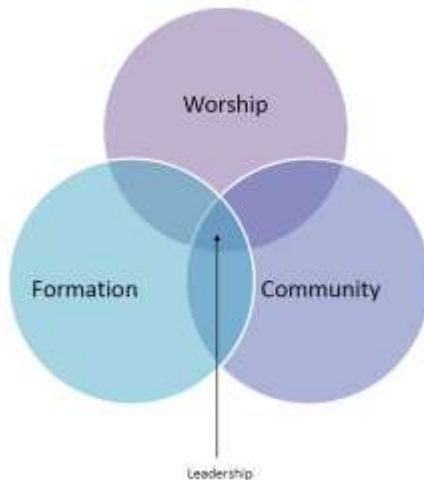
This time of year presents transitions. Some days I see folks walking around the “Westcott Nation” (the local, affectionate term for the Syracuse University neighborhood around Westcott Street) in shorts and t-shirts, and then other days are vestiges of the cold and cloudy winter we are preparing to leave behind. Transitions are not discrete events. They are fully woven into life itself. They characterize life. So, to say that St. Paul’s Cathedral is “in transition” is obvious, redundant, and to me, a bit dull. Rather, we’ve reached the point where we are all invited to take some action and to look up and out. And then get going.

Let’s go!

Imagine a multi-generational congregation, replete with cradle Episcopalians, returning Episcopalians, and those who have decided that they want what we have, and have been received into the Church.

What do we have?

We have a community of faithful people who have established priorities. A community learning and growing into a volunteer-driven model of worship, formation, and community outreach.



The Gospel today (John 12:1-8) was the story of Mary anointing Jesus' feet with a pound of costly perfume. Judas asked why the perfume was not sold for 300 denari and the money given to the poor. Jesus challenged Judas to be mindful of giving to the poor, and he charged Judas with doing so after he (Jesus) was gone. Jesus said the poor would always be around. The Gospel highlights the tensions and the conversations we are having at St. Paul's about where to invest our resources of time and talent. Should we join the Alliance of Communities Transforming Syracuse? Should we lease the old Brick Alley building and start a bookstore/coffee shop (one of my pet ideas)? How do we synthesize the Sudanese, or invite them to synthesize us, so that we are one St. Paul's? Questions, questions. They challenge, they provoke dialogue over coffee and cookies on Sunday morning in the Brewster room. They can, like the internet, provide and provoke a wealth of useful information to help guide action, and like the internet, they can also distract.



Let's live into the questions facing us. They are fabulous questions indeed. But while it may be tempting to ponder, process, and wonder, it is also critical that we move. I hope these folks don't mind me shining a bit of light on them, but I would like to use particular examples of playing to strengths and getting things going. Terry and Debbie Beishline saw the need for coordination of Ushers, so they have taken it upon themselves to write an Ushers' manual. Soon, we will have a formal document that can serve as a training manual and orientation guide for new Ushers. This inspires me. Betsy Elkins saw the need to organize the kitchen, and to create what we call in my field "job aids" so that folks can operate the coffee maker and the dishwasher. Dr. Richard Pilgrim is teaching a fabulous Adult Education course that I have found particularly impactful during the Lenten season. The attendance, by the way, has been impressive. And steady. Bill Pitcher's contributions to the Cathedral, where he gifts us with his technical expertise as an architect, deserve this entire article. I hope Bill that you know how valuable you are to us. Marilyn Sharron, the recent winner of a lifetime achievement award for her social work career (congratulations again, Marilyn), is preparing to initiate, publicize, and organize another round of Foyers. The Foyers, by the way, is a rotating dinner/brunch/sporting event/you figure out among yourselves social gathering that is just an amazing and impactful way to create and sustain fellowship. By the way, thank you to Ruth and Hal Brown, forever, for taking the initiative and reaching out to me to join their group. Who knew?

Lots of strengths within the hallowed walls of 310 Montgomery Street. Lots of potential priorities. St. Paul's vibrancy is attributable to faithful parishioners who identify, focus, and execute.

Embracing our Future by Creating our Future: Envisioning Cathedral Programs For the Year Ahead.

At our last meeting of the Christian Formation Ministry Team, John Doughty presented a process used effectively by many parishes to lay out proposed future programs in a useful graphic fashion. Called “Comprehensive Ministry Planning.” It begins with a large grid. Types of programs are spelled out on one axis (worship, pastoral care, service, and the like) and various constituencies (adults, youth, families, community and the like) on the other. At every place on the grid where a program type and a constituency meet, there exists an opportunity. Designing and prioritizing possible activity at each important intersection gives shape to a meaningful year ahead!

The Christian Formation Team was exploring the process because of particular resource concerns that we hope to address. But we quickly realized that the process would be useful for all of our ministry teams-- and for encouraging communication among teams, leadership, and the entire Cathedral. With that in mind, we are inviting all those serving on our three Cathedral ministry teams (Formation, Worship, and Community) to gather for an afternoon planning workshop on Sunday afternoon, April 11th from 2:30-5:30 in the Hansen Dining Room. We'll also extend an invitation to some special resource people so that the voices of our youth and other key groups are included. We'll bring the paper (big); pens (plenty); and maybe even a little sustenance for the task. We think it will be energizing!

The Emerging Church

The Emerging Church movement arose in the 1990's out of growing disillusionment with the institutional church. While some in this movement call for dismantling traditional structures in favor of new forms of worship, evangelism, and community; others are drawn to ancient forms of worship such as Lectio Divina and the sung Office. This current within the Emerging Church seeks authentic expressions of faith, emphasizing experience over doctrine, the poetic over rote ritual. Based on ten years of experience, Sue Wright believes that St. Paul's is well situated to respond to this community.

April 18 Rebecca Livengood El salvador & Cristosal Update

Recently returned from El Salvador, Rebecca Livengood serves as Co-Chair of The Fundación Cristosal, a foundation organized with extensive involvement from St. Paul's Cathedral and the Diocese of Central New York, to support the work of the Anglican Church of El Salvador. In this session, she will update us on recent developments as well as continuing needs.

John Keble, Anglican Poet

One of the most popular books of poetry in English during the nineteenth century was John Keble's "The Christian Year," structured on the liturgical calendar of the Church of England. Though still represented by hymn texts, Keble's work fell largely out of favor after the Victorian era. John Shaffer, who has collected over thirty editions of the influential work, offers a contemporary appreciation of Keble-- reformer, priest and poet.

May 2 Richard B. Pilgrim Christianities for the 21st Century

Cathedral chorister and Syracuse University religion scholar Dick Pilgrim offers current reflections on Peter Berger's "The Heretical Imperative: Contemporary Possibilities of Religious Affirmation". Writing in 1979, Berger noted that in the original Greek, "hereisis" simply meant "to choose," he asserted that modernity has created a situation in which choosing has become a necessity.

May 9 John Philip Jones

The Great Gray Spire

While several histories of St. Paul's Cathedral have been written during the church's lifetime, the most recent and insightful was written in 1985 by John Philip Jones-- who brought the fresh perspective of a recent arrival from the Church of England! John (and co-researcher Wendy) join us to review the "chances and changes" that shaped our parish. Valuable for newcomers and a welcome refresher for longtime parishioners.

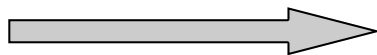
