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## From The Desk of The Dean

Garrison Keillor, the author and host of the radio program, “A Prairie Home Companion”, has said that the thing he loves about going to church at Episcopal Cathedrals is that it is like taking a trip to Europe, but you get home in time for lunch. I certainly relate to that comment, especially now that we are using Rite One during Lent. I can close my eyes at the 10:00 AM Mass and easily imagine being in one of the great Cathedrals in England.



At the same time, my experience at St. Paul’s is a bit more international because week after week, just by walking down a hallway, I go from Europe to the Sudan, and I get home closer to 3:00 PM than lunch time. At the 12:30 PM Mass I can close my eyes and easily imagine being in the Sudan. Indeed, the sound of



the Sudanese singing with drums is even more transporting, because it is so different from the space I am actually in! I open my eyes and can hardly believe I am at St. Paul’s in Syracuse! Enhancing all of these experiences are the Third Thursday Jazz Liturgies, which have not only changed the ways I think about and experience Christian worship. Now when I listen to recordings of jazz a picture of St. Paul’s Cathedral comes into my mind.



There is one part of Sunday morning that, rather than taking me to another place, actually grounds me to the present in Syracuse and excites me about the future, and that is teaching in our children's program. Most Sundays from 11:45-12:20 I teach the children's formation program, "Kid's Own Worship", to about 15-25 children. So far, all of the children are from the Sudanese congregation, except for two children from the 10:00 AM Mass, Serenity Baxter and Anna Wright Doughty. On the first Sunday of this program in January when Serenity and Anna walked into the room with fifteen Sudanese children Serenity turned to Anna and said, "These kids are African American, and I'm half black," ( which is true) to which blue-eyed blond-haired Anna replied, "I'm half black too!" Anna's comment is wonderful because it reveals the power of dominant culture, especially through a child's eyes. So far, Anna is still the only all white child in the class, but, quite honestly, I don't think the other kids notice or care. And it certainly has not held Anna back from a desire to fully participate!



It is so very exciting to me to not only see these children learning about one another (we have kids who were born in Syracuse, Cairo and the Sudan), and hearing the languages they speak (English, Arabic and Dinka), it is that they are learning to pray and talk about God together. And when we pray the Lord's Prayer, both in class and at the Altar at the 12:30 service, I fully realize that these children are not just the church of the future, they are the church now.

## **A Brief Message from the Senior Warden.....**

Many years ago at women's retreat; Marty Metzler introduced the concept of mandate, that we all had one. She read several mandate statements and encouraged us to choose one. . I spoke up that my mandate was older than any of the statements she had suggested.

“What does the Lord require of you? To Seek Justice and love Kindness and walk humbly with your God” Micah 6:8

I then shared with the women a tape of the Strathdees, a musical couple singing these beautiful words. I had first heard the song in a Presbyterian Youth Triennium held in Purdue in 1992. It was powerful to sing it in round with 5000 voices. It was equally powerful to sing it with a small group of women and then later with others at St. Paul's.

I believe I might have written about this experience before but it bears repeating, if I did, it's because these words continue to form all of my life, especially here at St' Paul's as we live into Embracing Our Future. The First Sunday of Lent 10:00 am. service began with the Great Litany procession, a solemn beautiful ritual that connects us with our history. Then I joined several others in the dining room for a Lenten class offered by Dr. Dick Pilgrim, “Lent's Loss, Easter's gain”, from the cross to the empty tomb. It was an exciting beginning of exploring symbols of death and denial and symbols of renewal and resurrection, of looking at old images through fresh eyes, as we embrace our faith. Still later as I left the cathedral, I heard the drumming signifying the beginning of the 12:30 service and greeted several of my church family, as they arrived for that service.

Another source of transformation is in the Cathedral Chapter. How many of you knew we had a Cathedral Chapter or what it did? I had attended once or twice in the past, but had no real sense of what it was about. Well, it has reformed with a vibrant committee of representatives from St. Paul's and the diocese. When it was active in the past, traditionally this group met maybe four times a year. Well, this group decided quickly, that four times a year was not enough and we are meeting monthly, exploring how to be a vital cathedral in this diocese as well as a parish church.

Much has happened, much has to be done, but it is exciting! I am especially pleased to welcome Julie Gedro as Junior Warden. Julie brings much energy and wisdom as well as a desire to learn wherever she goes. I look forward to serving with her as warden of St. Paul's Cathedral. Thank you.



# The Junior Warden Report.....

## Embracing Our Future and *Creating* Our Future!

One thing I know about the future, that I have learned through my scholarship and research, is that the future is not a fixed and it is not a given. I learned during my doctoral work how malleable it is. I understand how much agency people really do have when they have learned how to navigate the tension between stability, which is necessary for emotional and mental health and well-being, and change, which catalyzes growth and development. St. Paul's Cathedral stands majestically at the corner of a downtown intersection in Syracuse, New York. This is a given. If one Sunday morning, we all drove up to the Cathedral and there was a sign on the front door that said "We've moved to xxx," that disruption would create unnecessary disequilibrium for us all. We count on certain things being stable, so that we can focus on and achieve appropriately higher aspirations.

St. Paul's Letter to the Corinthians, Chapter 12, says:

*Now there are varieties of gifts, but the same Spirit; and there are varieties of ministries, but the same Lord; and there are varieties of workings, but the same God, who works all things in all. Now the manifestation of the Spirit is given to everyone for profit. To one through the Spirit is given the utterance of wisdom; and to another the utterance of knowledge; according to the same Spirit, to another the gift of healing, in the one Spirit; to another the working of miracles; to another prophecy; to another the distinguishing of spirits; to another various kinds of tongues, to another the interpretation of tongues. But all these things are the work of one and the same Spirit, who allots to everyone according as he will.*

As we implement, quite successfully so far, the plan for Embracing Our Future, there is clearly an opportunity for everyone at St. Paul's to engage in the service, activities, and projects that speak to each person individually, personally, and authentically. For example, I do not know how to knit a prayer shawl (though I am possibly going to learn), but I love to serve as a lay reader. I love to serve on the Altar Guild. Actually, I find Altar Guild the most sacred, most holy, and most humbling aspect of my service at St. Paul's. In the Embracing Our Future plan, we have identified leadership, worship, formation, and community as our strategic pillars. I invite you to grab a pillar! Grab a couple of them! In the community team, for example, we have sub-groups of hospitality, communications, and service/missions. Within each one of those sub-groups is the opportunity to serve in roles that require short bursts of activity, such as transporting for Van Duyn, or longer types of service commitments such as joining the Ushers or the Altar Guild.

We are not just embracing our future, we are creating it. A collective sense of the need for change was expressed back in 2009, when the Task Force was commissioned. We are now in the eye of that change. The field of Human Resource Development, which is my primary academic and practitioner focus, has studied change efforts and change management pretty extensively. In his article *Developing social network propositions to explain large-group intervention theory and practice*, (2007, *Advances in Human Resource Development*, published by Sage Journals, edited by Julia Storberg-Walker and Claire Gibbons), Stephen Garcia notes that

*Change efforts are often personally threatening to organizational members who have a stake in the status quo. Such resistance represents a significant obstacle to change implementation. Overcoming resistance and gaining...commitment is thus*

*critical to successful change. The literature on social networks suggests that strong social relationships, or strong ties, characterized by trust and frequent, rich interaction are crucial to the process of overcoming resistance and building commitment to organizational change (pp. 350-351).*

Just this past week, there was a wonderfully attended Women of St. Paul's luncheon on Friday. I did not conduct a headcount, but I can tell you there were three tables of participants, fully engaged in a rich and meaningful afternoon together. This morning, coffee hour was buzzing with people and conversation and connections, new and existing. The people, the relationships, the ties, the love and the trust between and among us are what make our Cathedral a *community*.

Our Embracing Our Future plan represents an exciting and thoughtful strategic decision for the Cathedral. Borrowing the language from another one of my fields, Strategic Management (and the current text on Strategic Management that I am using this term, written by Thomas Wheelen and David Hunger), a strategic decision is **rare** (having no precedent), **consequential** (commits substantial resources and demands a great deal of commitment from people), and **directive** (sets precedents for lesser decisions and future decisions throughout the organization).

Our future is happening now. Let's continue to create a wonderful one, employing God's many blessings in our lives. For me, service and engagement are how I demonstrate gratitude for my joy, abundance and very good fortune.

Thank you, by the way, for the confidence and trust you have expressed in me by electing me Junior Warden. A most humbling honor indeed.

On July 1, more than 60 years after her first airborne experience, President Barack Obama signed a bill that will award our Virginia Meloney, a parishioner of St. Paul's Cathedral, and her fellow Women Air Force Service Pilots with a Congressional Gold Medal for their service during World War II.

Virginia flew ferrying missions for the Air Transport Command from 1943-1944. Following graduation from the Sweetwater base, the female pilots were given a choice of command bases. Meloney chose Romulus Michigan, just outside of Detroit, where she flew new planes from factories to their destinations. "Often the first leg of the trip was to test the plane...It was a great life, we never knew mission to mission where we were going or what type of plane we would use," Meloney said. She says, "I considered it a pure gift to have piloted at least 25 different types of craft, from the small to the B-17 and B-24."

*"The Medal is nice but it is 60 years late for those who died in service and for those who have died since. The important thing is that we came up with a good record doing what we loved to do and still at the time felt we were helping our country. I still believe that the enemy is war itself, I have worked for peace ever since."*

Unfortunately Virginia will not be able to travel to Washington to receive the medal in person. We are very proud of Virginia, and honored that she is part of the rich life that makes up St. Paul's Cathedral.
